Description of Study	<p>The status of the Hungarian language has changed after 1990 at Babeş-Bolyai University. In the fall of 1990 students could already start to study ethnology and anthropology as well as journalism and library science in the Hungarian language alongside Hungarian language and literature. The Department of Hungarian Language and Literature was divided into the Department of Hungarian Literary Studies and the Department of Hungarian Language and Culture in 1993. And since 2002 the Faculty of Letters has had 3 Hungarian departments: Department of Hungarian Literary Studies, Department of Hungarian and General Linguistics and Department of Ethnology and Anthropolgy.</p> <p>The Department of Hungarian and General Linguistics and The Department of Hungarian Literary Studies offers multidisciplinary approaches, perspectives that could be a solid foundation for linguistic and literary researches. Our goal is to train open-minded and dialogue-centred teachers, learned and well-prepared professionals in media and cultural studies, researchers with a broad intellectual horizon.</p> <p>Our BA programme covers different fields of studies. Students majoring in Hungarian literature and language will choose a minor study field as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Hungarian language and literature – modern language and literature (English, Finnish, French,

Purposes of the Programme	<p>The graduates of Hungarian language and literary studies on the one hand will have proper knowledge in the field of Hungarian linguistics and in the science of Hungarian and world literature, and on the other hand they will have the necessary skills in order to be employed in fields typically covered by the graduates of the Faculty of Letters of BBU: as school teachers of Hungarian language and literature in classes where the language of teaching is Hungarian, in the cultural life, in the media and in other related fields.</p> <p>The graduates of Hungarian language and literary studies will possess the basic knowledge and the specific skills needed to further their studies and to improve these skills in future reasearch.</p>
Specialization / Area of Expertise	<p>The specialisation aims to form researchers in linguistics and literary studies.</p>
Extra Peculiarities	<p>Our university offers a series of different types of scholarships (including social ones) for its students. A special type of scholarship is awarded for undergraduate research by Márton Áron Nyelvészeti Szakkollégium (Márton Áron Linguistic College) and Láthatatlan Kollégium (Invisible College). Through bilateral agreements and a wide research network our specialization offers the possibility for our students to study in another country for a semester or for a whole academic year. Well-known foreign professors and researchers are regular guests of our programmes within the framework of the Hungarian research and education scheme of the university. Besides, the students have the opportunity to present their research at local and national phase of (Országos) Tudományos Diákköri Konferencia (Students Scientific Conference, Students National Scientific Conference).</p>

Practical Training	<p>Our students can take part in research seminars organized by Márton Gyula Linguistic College and the Invisible College, thus deepening their knowledge.</p> <p>Although a yearly international conference organized for PhD students, BA students can also attend the RODOSZ and present the findings and results of their research. The scientific discussions can help them with their future scientific agenda. The best scientific papers are published every year.</p>
